### Board to decide dog's fate Monday

PALMER — The Mat-Su Borough Animal Care and Regulation Board will decide the fate of Wizard on Monday, a sled dog that attacked a child in May at the kennel of Iditarold musher lake Berkowitz. The dog broke free of his restraints as a finnly visited dogs they had kenneled at Berkowitz's Apex Kennels. The dog attacked the 2-year-old girl's neck before the mother fought the dog away. The child sustained life threatening injuries in the attack. Shortly after the attack, a bor ough Animal Care and Regulation Sheller officer recommended that Wizard be classified as a level 5 animal, which means the dog must be seized and destroyed. Borough rules say that a dog that attacks a person that severely must be classified as such. But borough code also says an animal control officer

### Commission explains why permit was denied

PALMER — Among other things, the project would spread trash around the neighborhood and could contaminate groundwater, the Mat-Su Borough Planning Commission ruled Monday when it made public its reasons for denying a permit to Central Monofill Services.

"It is not possible to set conditions

"It is not possible to set conditions." to adequately protect the ground-water and aquifer from anticipated negative effects of the monofill," says the resolution the commission

approved, which spent a significant amount of time detailing ground-water concerns. The monofill project has been a controversial one for months in a neighborhood off of the Glenn Highway south of Palmer. The company seeking to locate a monofill there, CMS says the fill would contain building materials from its demolitien business that cannot be demolitien business that cannot be demolition business that cannot be recycled. Worries of contamination of groundwater, they have said, are unfounded. The material will be tightly controlled to ensure danger-

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
