Health Report: Canine Epilepsy

It is 8:00 p.m. on a windy, cold night. The seizure begins. Shania backs into the corner and slowly looses consciousness as she aimlessly falls to her side. She vocalizes a slow and terrifying whine as her lower muscles start to contract. She then starts to paddle. This goes on for just a few short minutes. It seems like an eternity. Finally, she lays motionless. It is over. Shortly, she will get up. This I have described as a grand-mal seizure.

Watching your beloved dog in the throes of a grand-mal seizure can be the most horrifying moment you will ever witness. The seizure begins with the contraction of the lower muscles and loss of consciousness. The dog will then fall to its side stretched out with head back. Sometimes they will vocalize. Doctors say this does not indicate pain. Often the dog will drool, urinate or defecate. This portion is very brief and leads to the next stage. This consists of clamping of the jaws or paddling/ running movements of the legs. Following the seizures, the dog will lay motionless for a brief period. Eventually they will get up and show post seizure behavior. These signs include: blindess, disorientation, pacing or running around bumping into objects or walls.

Canine Epilepsy is one of the top ten diseases in dogs today. This silent killer recks havoc in the brain, muscle and nerve tissue of your dog's body. Because there are many causes of recurrent seizures, canine epilepsy is not a specific disease or even a single syndrome, but rather a diverse category of disorders. Idiopathic epilepsy means that there is no identifiable brain abnormality other than seizures. Symptomatic epilepsy is seizures that are the consequences of an identifiable lesion or other specific cause.

Some of us feel very alone when friends or relatives do not understand our grieve. It takes a very special person with a tremendous amount of courage, love and patience to deal with seizures and keep up their spirits as well. Shania has now crossed over the Rainbow Bridge and she is playing and running seizure-free with all her other border collie friends awaiting the day that Todd and I will return to her.

The Comets website features a Member's Only section dedicated to fulfilling the internal needs of our team. Among other things, such as the Comet Message Board and detailed tournament data, there is a statistics page. This page, unlike the version available to the general public, is used by the team to chart our growth, performance, and ability. Log in to Member's Only.

Press the "Stats" button from the right sidebar.

Scroll down to "Dog Stats."

Click on your dog's name.

As you scroll through the practices on the dog's page, any where you see a "Add Comments" beside the "Handler" category, just click.

Fill out the form and press the submit button.
